






PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

TRADITIONAL PROGRAM & COUPLES MATCHES

Our Bigs are doing BIG things with their Littles when they get together every week. Children who spend time with a mentor gain confidence, acquire new skills and competencies and learn the importance of showing care for others. Mentors experience a sense of discovery and enjoyment as they experience the world through a child's eyes.

In 2022, we had 51 wonderful adult volunteers making a BIG difference to 49 children in the community.

IN-SCHOOL MENTORING PROGRAM

An hour a week is all it takes to make a huge difference in a child's life, and over the last year, with our return to in person meetings we have had **40 adult**, **high school and college student in-school mentors spending quality time** with **147 school-aged children**. Our in-school mentors get the chance to feel like a kid again as they meet with their mentee to play games or sports, bake something, or use the computer. It is time well spent building a child's confidence, sharing a laugh and learning something new.

GO GIRLS! AND GAME ON!

Go Girls! Healthy Bodies, Healthy Minds and Game On! Eat Smart, Play Smart, Live Smart are group based mentoring programs run by volunteer mentors. Through non-traditional physical activity, Go Girls! is designed to provide girls aged 12-14 with the information and support they need to make informed choices about healthy, active living. Through non-traditional physical activity and healthy eating support, boys aged 12-14 who participate in Game On! learn to make informed choices about a range of healthy lifestyle practices. In 2022, we served 141

children through these group mentoring programs.

Through weekly quest speakers, a variety of workshops and many fun activities, our campers learned the importance of giving back in their neighbourhoods and communities.

2022 EVENT REPORT

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington was limited in the number of fundraising events it was able to host in 2022. To those who participated, sponsored or supported these events – thank you.

Move For Kids

In 2022, as an alternative to our annual Bowl For Kids Sake event, we launched a virtual initiative called "Move For Kids". This initiative provided registrants an opportunity to engage in a physical activity of their choice, for which they collected pledges of much needed funds to benefit BBBSC. Some examples of activities people chose to do were a "polar dip", walking/running, social distanced relay activities and more. Including sponsorships and pledges, this online event raised over \$6000 to benefit the various programs and services offered at Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington.

This event was a great success as golfers gathered at Deer Creek Golf Club to enjoy a gorgeous day on the greens in September. The event helped raise just over \$14,600.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As we transitioned from the 2021 COVID-19 pandemic to a measured level of normalcy in 2022, our organization was also able to stabilize our finances. From an operational deficit in 2021, we ended the fiscal year 2022 with a small surplus due to increased revenue from donations, grants, and program registration coupled with controlled expenses. A surplus for a non-profit organization like ours in 2022 was not a small feat as it was a challenging year for comparable organizations, and it displays unified dedication to being financially responsible on the part of the Executor Director, the superb efforts of our staff, and the Board of Directors.



We expect headwinds in 2023 due to a weak economic outlook where many experts anticipate a recession. The inflation is at an unprecedented level and is being swiftly felt by all income groups, which will likely have an adverse effect on donations and fundraising efforts while increasing our expenses. We are adjusting and adapting to our new normal, where we can no longer expect substantial assistance from the government, such as the CEWS (Canada Emergency Wage Subsidies), which was instrumental in balancing our financials during the COVID years. Therefore, our organization is committed to pursuing more consistent revenue streams to combat the financial downturn but requires the assistance of our donors and our community to continue our efforts in guiding and mentoring the youths of the Clarington community.

I want to offer a heartfelt thank you to all of our sponsors, donors, and volunteers that have supported our organization through your time, money, and efforts. We can continue our agency's mission because you believe in us. I ask that you continue to trust us to positively impact the lives of wonderful families in Clarington.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Directors of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington:

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2022 and the statements of operations, changes in net assets, and of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington as at December 31, 2022, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the organization derives revenue from donations and fundraising, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington. Therefore, I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to recorded donations and fundraising, excess of revenues over expenses, cash flows from operations for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, current assets as at December 31, 2022 and 2021, and net assets as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2022 and 2021 years. My audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2021 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this scope limitation.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Clarington in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is
 sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement
 resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery,
 intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are
 appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the
 organization's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statement or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or condition may cause the organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during the audit.
